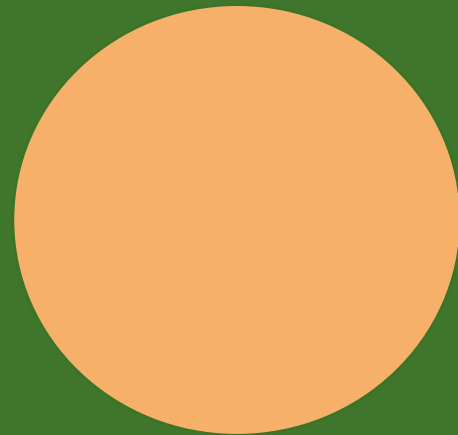
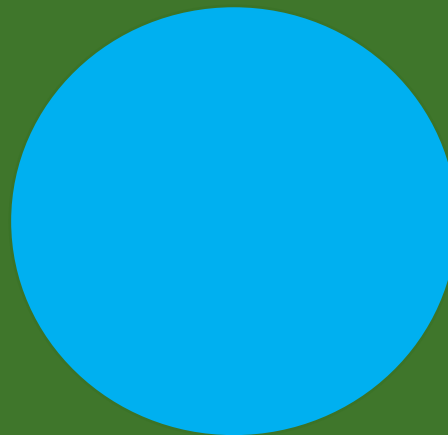
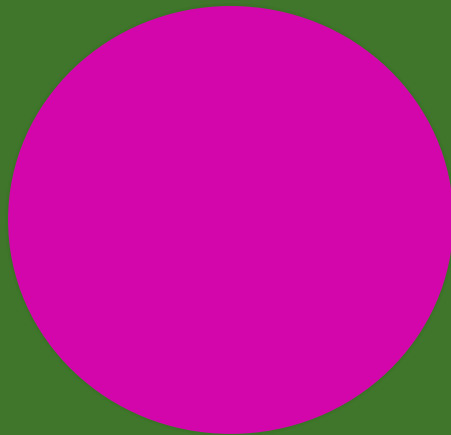
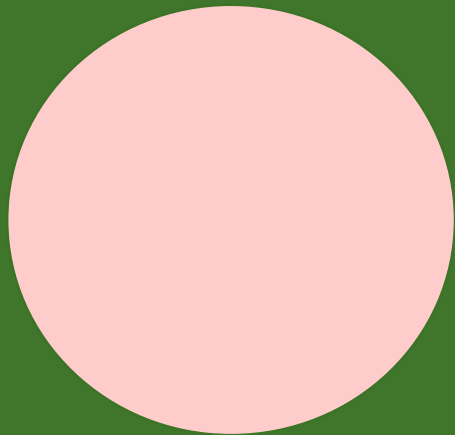


SHADE GARDEN NATIVE PLANT SCAVENGER HUNT

Read These Tips!

Location Hints

The Shade Garden is one of the smallest demonstration gardens. Several of the plants have identification markers, but many don't.

Plant ID

If a plant you are looking for doesn't have a marker, you will have to compare leaf size and shape to the photos for each search activity.

Seasonal Differences

Not recommended for winter. Also, pay attention to clues about when plants bloom. A plant that blooms in the spring may have seed pods or berries by summer/fall. Some plants bloom in the fall.

Natural Spread

You may find the plant in more than one place or other than where we identify.

Answers

We provide answers as you go along (so if you skip ahead, you may see where plants are).

There is no time limit.

Virginia Sweetspire

Itea virginica

I am a showy, easy-to-grow shrub with spires of fragrant white blossoms in the spring and leaves of flaming red to orange in the fall. Birds hide in me and pollinators love me.

I prefer partial shade with moist soil. I can grow to 10 feet tall and 6 feet wide. I am not evergreen, but my leaves stay long into winter.

Hint: I am near the entrance of the Shade Garden

BLOOM TIME: MAY AND JUNE

White Wood Aster

Eurybia divaricata

My small, white, daisy-like flowers look like delicate clouds when they bloom in late summer. I am a ground cover that grows from 1-1/2 to 2-1/2 feet tall.

Pollinators love my flowers, and winter birds enjoy my seeds.

Hint: You can find me under a tree not far from a bench.

BLOOM TIME: LATER SUMMER TO EARLY FALL

White Wood Asters are below the American Holly tree in the front of the Shade Garden. You can probably find them in other spots as well because they spread easily.

Black Cohosh

Actaea racemosa

My tall plumes of creamy white flowers, on wand-like stalks, bloom from May to July. Many say they smell bad, like medicine or stale popcorn, but some say they smell like grape soda! I am over six feet tall when mature.

My seeds develop in capsules from August to October and make a rattling sound when shaken.

Fun Fact: Black Cohosh root has long been used for medicinal purposes by Native Americans and physicians.

BLOOM TIME: LATE TO TO JULY

Fringetree

Chionanthus virginicus

I am a showy native tree that can grow to 35 feet tall. When you see me in the spring you will see where I get my name, because I am covered with fragrant, drooping clusters of white and cream flowers.

Hint: From outside the garden, you can find me along the outside path.

My wide, spear-shaped leaves turn yellow in the fall.

Fun Fact: The Fringetree is sometimes called 'Old Man's Beard' because of its white, shaggy flowers.



BLOOM TIME: MAY TO JUNE

Golden Ragwort

Packera aurea

I am a low ground cover that temporarily multiplies my height in the spring, when I sprout masses of yellow, daisy-like flowers on tall stalks. Pollinators flock to me because I am one of the earliest natives to bloom each year.

I am an aggressive self-sower. If you want to slow my spread, cut off my dandelion-like seed heads before they blow all over your garden.

BLOOM TIME: EARLY APRIL TO JUNE

Location of Golden Ragwort

The Golden Ragwort plants are throughout the Shade Garden, since they spread easily and are a ground cover that loves moist and shady spots. In this photo, the Golden Ragwort is at the entrance to the garden, in the bottom right corner under the tree.

Wild Ginger

Asarum canadense

Fun facts: I love shade. My brown flowers hide underneath my leaves in the spring and are pollinated by ants and beetles!

Don't eat me because I'm not the ginger root that is used for cooking!

Tradescantia virginiana

I was named as “wildflower of the year” by the Virginia Native Plant Society in 2008. My blossoms are usually deep purple with a bright yellow pistil, but sometimes they are also white.

Hint: You will see me in several places in the garden because I spread easily.

Royal Fern

Osmunda spectabilis

I am one of the largest native ferns in North America and grow up to 6 feet tall. If you see me early in the spring, you will see my my “fiddleheads” before they unfurl. I can grow in partial sun, but I prefer to live in a shady space where the soil doesn’t dry out.

Hint: From the bench, look past the Eastern Redbud tree and you will see me on one of the garden terraces.

Ferns don’t have seeds, but we have spores. My gold/brown spores appear above my leaves and look like tassels. I am also sometimes called Regal Fern.

Shrubby St. John's Wort

Hypericum frondosum

I am a bushy plant with bright yellow flowers. Each flower has many stamens that form a little ball in the center. Bees love my pollen! I can grow up to 4 feet tall!

Hint: Before you enter the garden, walk to your left. I grow along the paved path. Look for the bees buzzing around my flowers!

BLOOM TIME: JUNE TO MID-SUMMER

Foamflower

Tiarella cordifolia 'Running Tapestry'

I'm a low-growing plant, so I'm not easy to see, but if you get down near the ground, you'll see how interesting I am! My dark green leaves have purple spots along the veins and my bright white flowers sit at the top of long, thin stems.

the path to
the right and
look left.

Cup Plant

Silphium perfoliatum

I am one of the tallest plants in
the Shade Garden. I can grow
up to 8 feet tall, so look up to
find my bright yellow flowers
blooming in late summer and
early fall. My leaves can grow
up to 14" long! Look closely at
my stem; it's square.

My common name is Cup
Plant because the base of
my leaves forms a little cup
that collects rainwater for
birds and insects.

Cardinal Flower

Lobelia cardinalis

If you come to the Shade Garden in late summer or early fall, you can't miss me! I'm a tall, bright red flower at the top of an upright stem. I can grow up to 6 feet tall! I am the same color as Virginia's state bird, the Cardinal.

Hummingbirds love me and can stick their long beaks into my flowers to drink my nectar.

Bottlebrush Buckeye

Aesculus parviflora

I am a tall shrub (I can grow up to 12 feet!) with large leaves that grow like fingers off the palm of a hand. You can see my tall feathery white flowers in June and July.

Bees love me but deer do not. In fact, my leaves are poisonous!

Hint: I grow well in partial shade. When you walk into the entrance, turn to your left. I am growing behind the bench, near the green toolbox. You can also see me from the paved path.
